Four Steps to Responsibility

If children are going to survive and thrive in tomorrow's complex world, they need practice solving as many problems as possible...today! The following process is designed to get kids thinking more about their problems than we do.

Step 1: Provide a strong and sincere dose of empathy.

Empathy allows the child to stay calm enough to solve the problem..and learn from it. Experiment with saying something like: "Oh no. This is a problem. I bet that's really upsetting."

Step 2: Hand the problem back.

After you have proven that you care, ask: "What do you think you might do to solve this problem?"

Don't be shocked if the child mumbles, "I don't know."

Step 3: Ask permission to share what "some kids" have tried.

Avoid giving suggestions until you have asked: "Would you like to hear what some other kids have tried?"

Step 4: Provide two or three alternatives for solving the problem.

Remember to avoid resistance by saying:
"Some kids decide to _____. How would that work for you?"

Step 5: Allow the child to solve or not solve the problem.

Resist the urge to tell the child which alternative to pick. End the session (talk) by showing your faith in the child:
"Good luck! Let me know how this turns out."

We can't wait to see what we learn next!

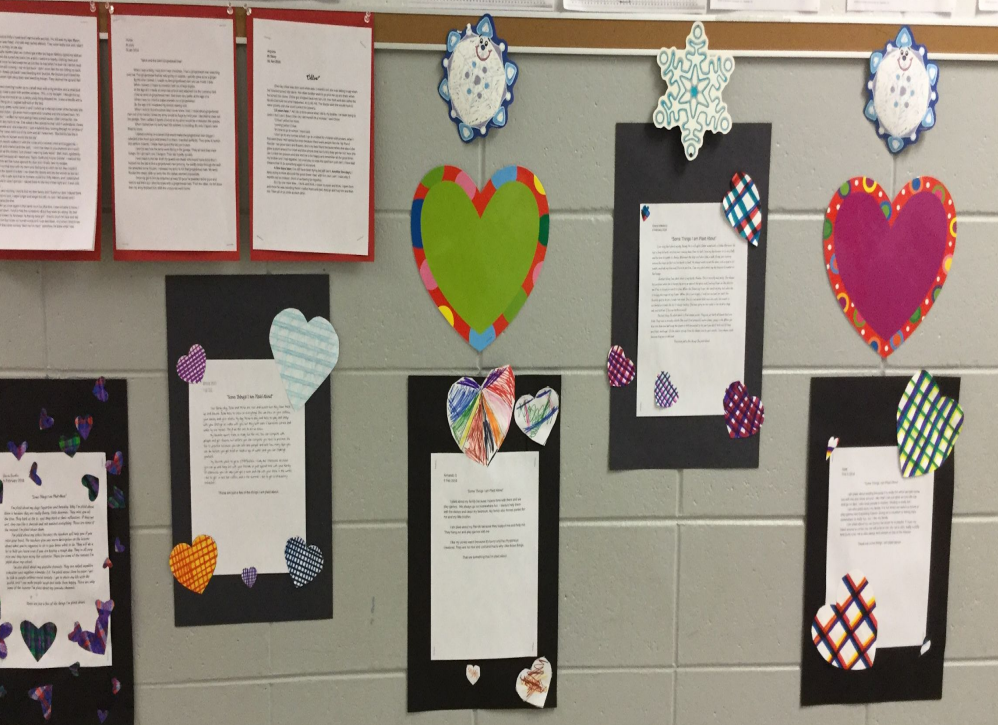








5th Grade Update



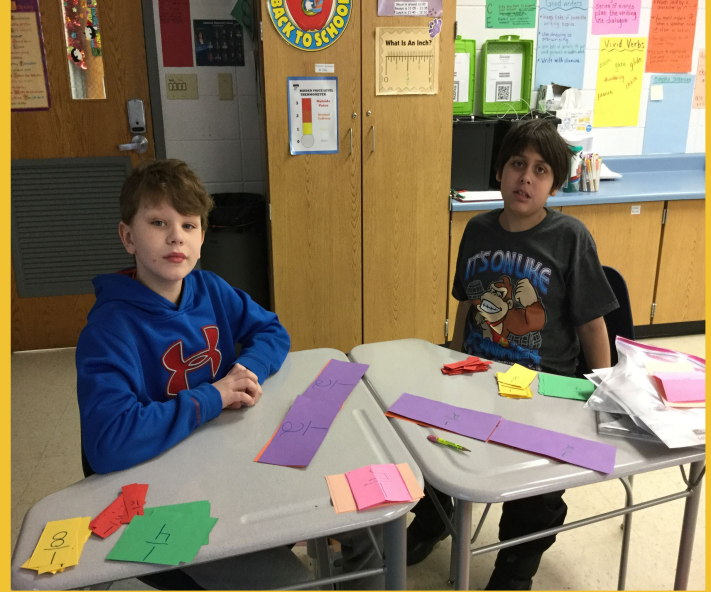

At home each night, they continue to read at least 30 minutes in a fiction book of their choice. All this reading gets logged and added to the fifth grade 40 Book Challenge and Six Flag Reading, too.

In writer's workshop, students have been writing a variety of imagined narratives and in math students worked a lot with decimal numbers (addition, subtraction, multiplication and division) and now they are digging into fractions with lots of games and activities.

In science, Mrs. Osborne's class has been designing and building robotic chassis in PLTW while Mrs. Destree's homeroom has been working on dioramas on one of the 5 regions of the United States.

Finally, some classmates recently attended the Math 24 competition in Bristol, and others will soon compete in the upcoming Math Meet in March. We also had some students who participated in the school spelling bee. Great job 5th grade! We can't wait to see what the third trimester brings!





Middle School English/Language Arts

We are currently in the middle of a writing unit called "The Literary Essay: From Character to Compare/Contrast." Our students are just wrapping up their first literary essay in which they analyzed the character traits of a protagonist in a short story. Our students made claims with regards to that character, and supported them with textual evidence. We learned outlining methods and the proper structure that will serve them throughout high school and beyond. Soon, we'll be writing about theme. Ultimately, we will compose a five paragraph essay comparing and contrasting the themes across two texts.

We are encouraged by the writing the students are producing. We have noted great growth since the beginning of the year! The work we are doing is not easy, but Lakewood students know how to face challenges head on!
